114th Conference-by Pam Madzima



Tuskegee University held the 114th Annual Farmers' Conference on February 23-24, 2006. The Annual Farmers' Conference dates back from 1892, when Booker T. Washington observed the need to seek remedies to improve the conditions of rural black farmers in the South, who had just gone through slavery, and were facing social, economic, and educational and morale problems. Today, this work continues as agricultural workers focus on addressing the problems that small-scale farmers, landowners and communities face in managing changes in agriculture. The theme for this year's conference was: *Small Rural Farms Partnering in Local, National and Global Markets*, to demonstrate the capability of smaller farms to produce beyond their communities. The objectives of the conference were to (1) share up-to-date information relevant to

small-scale farmers and landowners involved in the production of traditional and alternative agricultural products; (2) create an awareness about family health, nutritional challenges, and existing resources for rural families; and (3) strengthen networks and partnerships that address problems of small-scale agriculture and rural communities. A great wealth of information was presented by various USDA agencies, University specialists, Extension staff, community-based organization staff, and farmers. Information disseminated to the audience included, small farm cooperative marketing and value added product development opportunities; programs and opportunities involving youth in agriculture; upcoming grant opportunities available from the Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education Program for small farmers; health awareness targeting

obesity management and treatment strategies; wills, estate planning and personal finance management for financially distressed families; and landowner protection procedures from illegal use of land. Some of the keynote speakers included, Honorable Bobby Singleton, Alabama's 24th District State Senator; Mr. Ralph Paige, the Federation of Southern Cooperatives/Land Assistance Fund's Executive Director; and Alabama's State Commissioner of Agriculture, Ron Sparks. A special highlight of each year's conference is to honor the legacy of Thomas Monroe Campbell, Sr., the nation's first Cooperative Extension Agent, and to award the Merit Farm Family award. Mr. Alphonso Hooks from Shorter, Alabama was awarded the 2006 Merit Farm Family Award for exhibiting agricultural success and dedication to community service. The Farmer's Conference, which drew many participants from all over the South, including Frank Taylor President of the Winston County Self-Help Cooperative was afforded an opportunity to dialogue the cooperative's credo of helping save to save rural America.
