During the Week of April 17, 2006, the students at CDC presented their Oral/Visual Presentations part of their Career Portfolio. The Idea of the Career Portfolio is to provide students with a collection of records that will document their educational accomplishments, work history and affirm their career goals and successes.

There are 19 various programs at the Career Development Center. Each 2<sup>nd</sup> year student is required to complete the Career Portfolio. The students had the option of completing a career journal based on their experiences while job shadowing; or completing an internship in a program related business setting; or an Occupational Research Paper based on a career related to their Program of Study at CDC.

The students from various programs such as Agricultural & Environmental Science, Early Childhood Development, Hotel Management & Tourism and many others made

presentations that were creative and informative based on their research on their job shadowing experience.

Students were judged on their presentations based on a standard rubric utilized throughout the JPS District for the Senior Project/Career Portfolio. Panels of judges from within the respective areas of study donated their time and expertise to these future leaders of tomorrow.

Cattle Marketing Workshop at the Southern University Ag Center in Baton Rouge. The workshop, the first in a series, was held May 12 and 13.

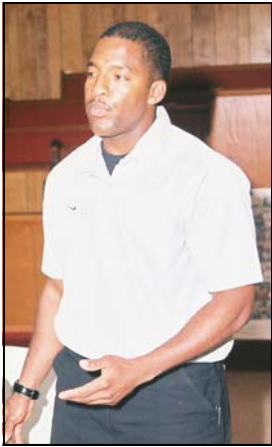
